NS-SEC does distinguish between these two categories, but as subcategories (see page 13, Table 3 in this document:

) – 1. Higher managerial, administrative and professional occupations can be split into 1.1–Large employers and higher managerial and administrative occupations and 1.2 Higher professional occupations.

Since we do not include the analytic NS-SEC 8 category "Never worked and long-term unemployed", our variable still has 8 categories because the top NS-SEC category is split into two (Large employers & higher management vs Higher professional).
